Eleven students from the *Assets Advisory Committee* spent a mild, sunny fall day at the beach installing snow fencing on November 5. The student group, associated with the Lakeshore Excellence Foundation, adopted Lincoln Township Beach last year. Dedicated to improving our community, the group has been volunteering their time to take care of the park.

To help keep sand on the beach and prevent it from ending up in the parking lot, the students set up 250 feet of snow fencing in two rows at the base of the bluff. Parks Commissioner Mike Lucker drove in 70 posts while the students assembled the fencing and used wire ties to attach it to the posts. A Christmas Carole Classic

The Lakeshore Excellence Foundation is proud to announce the staged reading of Charles Dickens’ Christmas classic, “A Christmas Carol.” The Staged Reading is being performed by the Twin City Players and is based on the same script Dickens himself used when he gave public readings over 150 years ago. Dickens was as well known for his live readings as he was for his famous writings.

The Staged Reading is being performed at the Lakeshore Middle School for both 7th grade English classes with over 200 students participating in this event. The reading will require no props, no sets and no costumes. There will be three actors, three music stands and three scripts.

Per 7th Grade English Teacher, Jeanne Sotnyk, this program was designed as part of an eight to ten day unit geared toward enriching the student’s comprehension skills as well as introducing them to new vocabulary. The unit will end with the Staged Reading.
